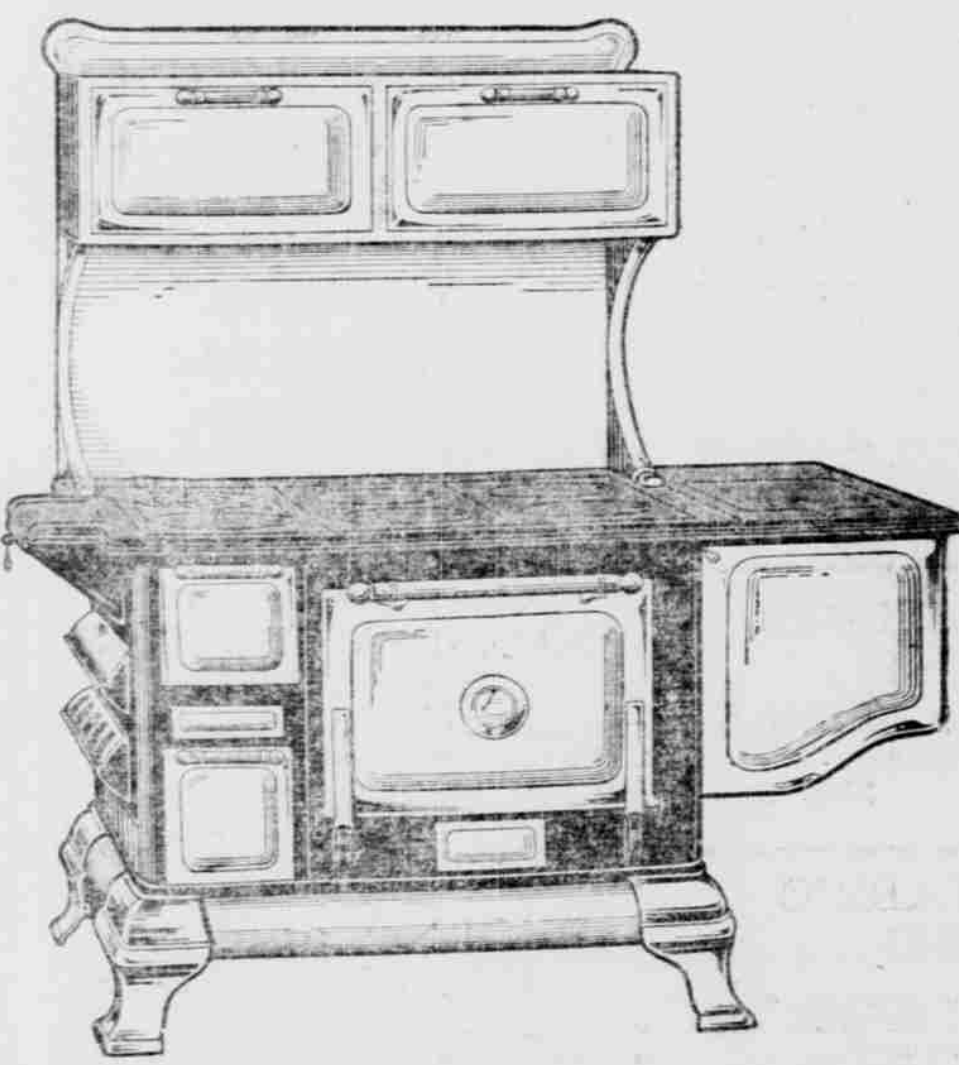

Disposal of Gas Taxes for Nine Months

Secretary Dalbey of the state department of finance, has prepared a statement showing the collection and disposition of the gasoline tax from April 1, 1925, when the tax law became effective, to January 31, 1926.

The collections for this period reported by the division of gasoline tax, department of agriculture, was \$2,207,377.77. The balance covers nine months' collections, January not included. From that there was deducted \$194,286.96, of which \$60,000 is held in reserve to defray the expenses of the gasoline division, or so much of it as may be necessary, and there was deducted \$125,000 as provided by law for maintenance of the engineering division of the department of public works, and also \$8,286.96 of 4½c funds made in accordance with the gasoline tax law for taxes paid upon gasoline used in tractors or combined used exclusively for agricultural purposes.

In addition \$2,007,546.81 as a highway fund was transferred to the department of public works, and that department has expended in construction and road maintenance \$885,396.85, leaving a balance of \$1,122,149.96 in the gasoline highway fund.

The finance department statement shows that out of the \$60,000 appropriated out of gasoline taxes for the support of the gasoline tax division only \$5,413.42 has been expended in ten months. Of that amount \$4,176.62 was spent for payment of salaries and wages of employees, \$422.77 for office supplies, \$395 for postage, telephone, printing, transportation, board and lodging, and \$415.73 for office equipment, leaving a balance of \$6,586.58 on hand.

The expenses of the office including salaries and wages for the month of January totaled \$570.10. This was made up of \$445 salary for employes, \$118.10 for office supplies and \$7 for telephone and telegraph. In the past ten months only \$20 has been spent for board and lodging of employes traveling on business for the gas tax division.
