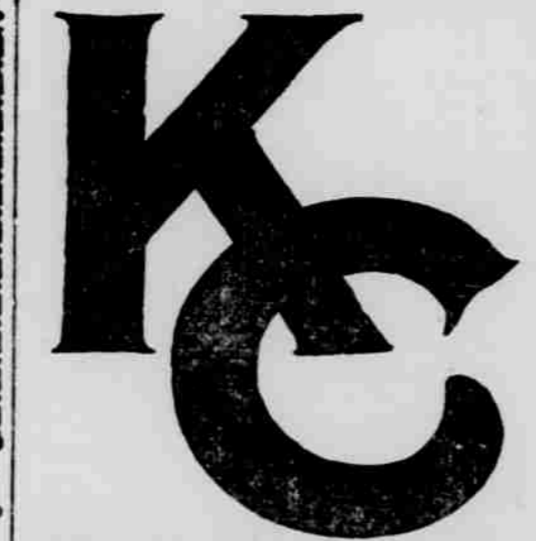

BIG LITTLE MEN

Chief Justice Taft once remarked when he was president. "It's surprising how often you hear people say, 'He's little, but he can lick his weight in wildcats!' or 'He's little but he's loud!' I have noticed the popular impression that shortness of stature frequently goes with unusual ability. I also notice that little men are great keep-at-it fellows. They develop an inexhaustible energy."

Socrates was short of stature. Napoleon was, too. So was St. Paul. Marcus Loew, the theatre magnate, is about five and a half feet tall. Charles P. Steinmetz, who wrought miracles with electricity until the day of his death, was not much over four feet.

The little man, when he talks about his size, almost invariably brags about it. It is as if he had forced himself to take pride in it.

But he will brush his hair pompadour or wear high-heeled shoes to make himself look taller. His camouflage in dress is a key to his character. He has become able and industrious because of his constant desire to show the world that, in spite of his physical littleness, he is in fact one of the biggest men in town.

When he was a boy, his playmates called him "runt" and "shorty." In college he was informed he was too light to make the football team. He had to fight with superhuman ferocity to keep the big boys from licking him. In his heart he has said: "I'll show 'em I'm as powerful as they are!"

Consequently, he goes into life with the will to excel highly developed and with a fighting temperament which is often irresistible.

When Donald MacMillan, the arctic explorer, assembled his crew for his trip into polar regions last winter, he announced that he would take with him only little men because they can endure more than the big fellows." He understood that the little fellows, having learned to overcome the handicap of small stature since infancy, would go valiantly and victoriously against all other obstacles.

The little man's psychology is an inspiration to the rest of the world. In beating his littleness he demonstrates that every man has in him the stuff wherewith to overcome any personal handicap or weakness.

LIKABLE

Young John Coolidge, son of the president, had a fight the other day. It was perfectly legitimate, with no hard feelings; he boxed another student at Amherst college in a tournament.

He gives evidence of sportsmanship in expressing a wish to meet his opponent again. He conducted himself well in the ring, too; fought hard, got slightly the worst of it, but acquitted himself with credit.

He seems to be a mighty likeable boy. And that's more to his credit than it is in the case of the average lad, for it would be very easy for a youngster in his position to get awfully spoiled and conceited.

TASK FOR THE CHURCHES

In an easter city several clergymen have pledged themselves to the elimination of the controversial issues in religious teaching. They are planning the inauguration of a concerted campaign for the moral training of boys and girls. In this way they expect not only to improve and reinforce the instruction in right living given the youth of their own constituencies but also to reach out in an organized way to influence the many who are growing up without spiritual guidance.

This systematic movement ought to spread until it becomes national. No church can be truly effective without a creed, and the principles of that creed no doubt should be expounded at suitable times and seasons. But so long as there is variety in human thought and expression there will continue to be differences in religious convictions. Of paramount importance, however, is the fact that in the vast realm of human conduct the various religious beliefs are a unit on the essentials of morality and righteousness.

While only 50,000,000 of this nation's population of 110,000,000 are actual church members, the official estimates of church authorities place the church constituency, including not only members but also all those who are reached by the church in one way or another, at 90,000,000 to 100,000,000. The 200,000 different churches influencing this constituency stand together against dishonesty, lying, irreverence, intemperance of every sort and all the sins classified in the decalogue, and for the fatherhood of God, the brotherhood of man and the practice of the Golden Rule.

If the full pressure of that united strength were brought to bear against the evils of the time, an era of righteousness would be ushered in. This common task of the churches calls for intelligent, systematic, cooperative effort. If the country's moral forces were efficiently organized the results of their helpful teachings would be wonderful.

It would be well for the churches to consider whether in entering upon the work of framing and enforcing laws to regulate human conduct they have departed in some degree from their true province of moral teaching and spiritual leadership and, if so, whether that departure has tended in any degree to relax their hold upon the minds and hearts of the people whom they so earnestly desire to direct into right courses.
