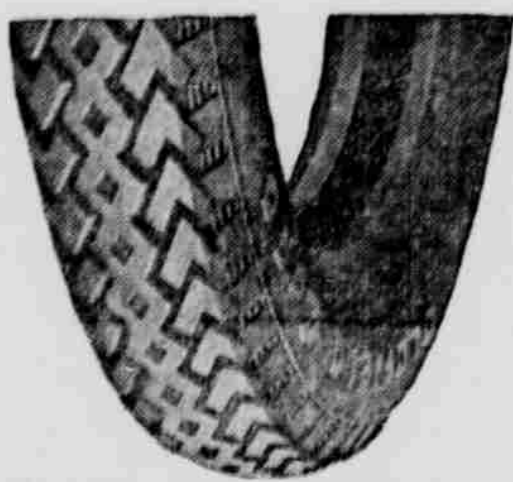

Plattsmouth Junior High Has Track Meet

First Annual Meet of Grade Schools Draws Out a Pleasing Attendance and Showing.

From Saturday's Daily—Despite a high wind, and muddy field, the Plattsmouth junior high held their first annual track and field meet at the tourist park last evening after school.

The object of such meets is not only to give the boys an opportunity to test their own ability but also to create an interest in track work so that in future years the high school boys will be more interested in track than they have heretofore been.

In the 50 yard dash Chester Wiles of 7A took first place, Hershel Dew of 8A second, and Lafe Sharp of 7A third.

In the 100 yard dash Chester Wiles also took first, Hershel Dew second and Charles Nowacek of 8B third.

In the shot put Hershel Dew of 8A took first place with 39 feet 6 inches, Charles Nowacek of 8B second with 28 feet 6 inches, and Francis Warren of 7A third with 25 feet 8 inches.

The pole vault was the best event when Ewing Sharp of 8C cleared better than 9 feet, his brother Lafe, of 7A was second with 8 feet 6 inches and Garland McCleary third with 7 feet 3 inches.

In the high jump Lafe Sharp of 7A was first, Ewing Sharp second, and Garland McCleary of 8B third.

The broad jump was also won by Lafe Sharp with a jump of 15 feet 4 inches. Ewing Sharp was second with 14 feet 7 1/2 inches, and Hershel Dew was third with 14 feet 7 inches.
