pensate accidents, but a plan to prevent accidents. Compulsory insurance compels the careful and well behaved drivers to pay for injuries done by the careless or the reckless. Thousands of cars are owned by farmers, most of whom own land and are entirely responsible financially, and careful drivers as well. Is it fair to charge them \$30 a year or more for each car they own, to pay for the damage caused by reckless driving and traffic congestion in the cities?
