Once upon a time there was a city, town or hamlet that did not expect to get one or both 1928 conventions.

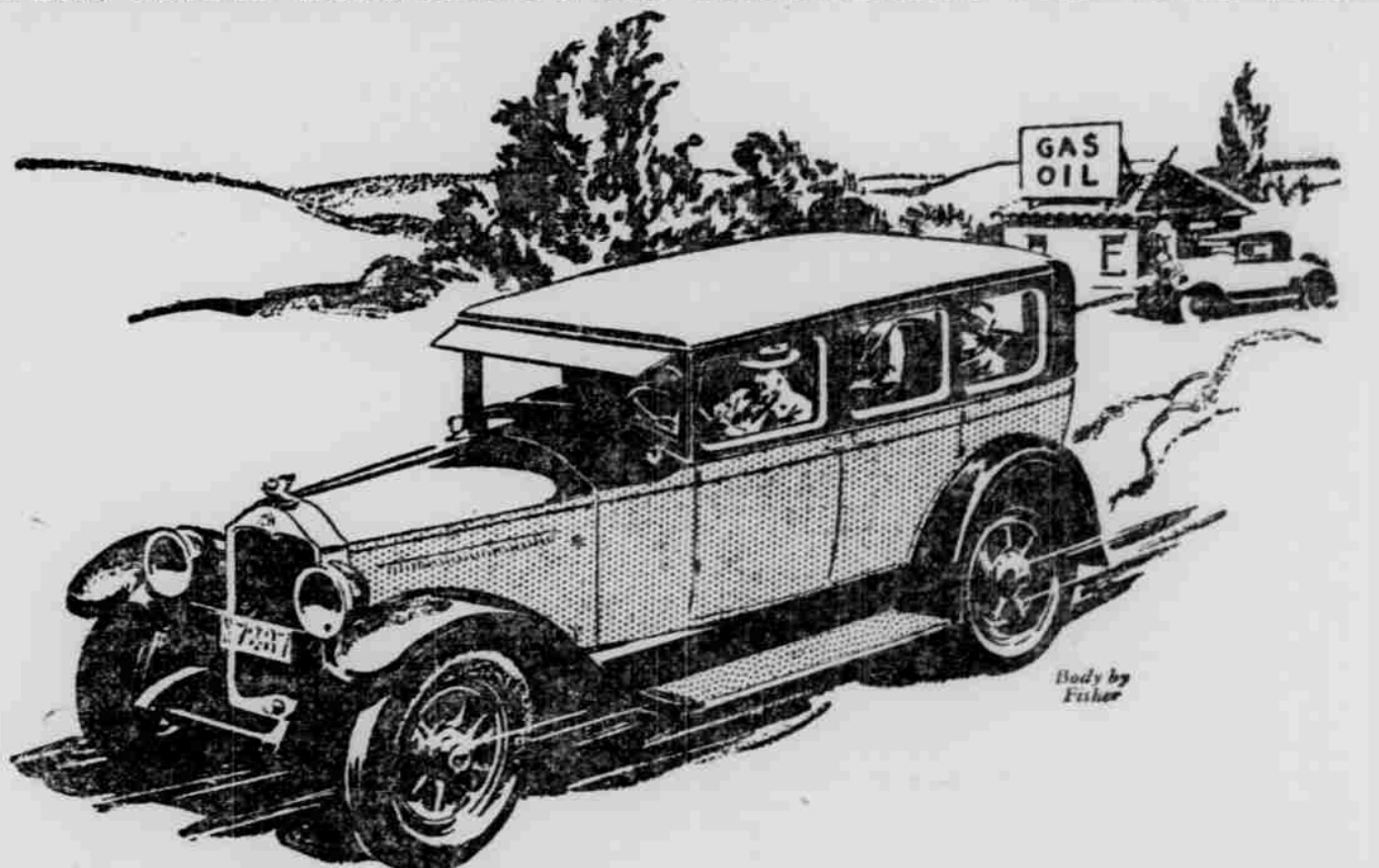
