Labor Cost is Reduced by Machinery

Lincoln Star, Oct. 17.—A new development has been prepared for the country that promises to return an annual saving of about \$355,000.00 to the mark growers of the state.

In the introduction of more efficient and less expensive machinery to agriculture, nothing allied with agriculture that could be for a ten year period, makes the yearly amount \$14,500.
