DR. WISE ALLOWED TO GO

New York, April 15.—The resignation of Dr. Stephen S. Wise from the administrative committee of the Zionist organization of America was accepted today by the national executive committee "with regret." A resolution of confidence in the administrative committee and in Dr. Weibmann, president of the world Zionist organization, was adopted

unanimously, approving their action in the controversy with Dr. Wise.

Dr. Wise resigned last year as chairman of the political committee of the Zionist meeting of the world held in Switzerland, because of differences of opinion with leaders of the group, who he said were fostering a policy of inaction in Palestine.

U. S. Chamber Urges a Big Cut in Tax Rates

\$394,000 Slash Demanded By Official Speaking to Senate Committee

Washington.—Standing pat on its program of tax reduction, the United States chamber of commerce which came to grips with the administration on this subject early in the present session, presented its recommendations today to the senate finance committee.

Submitted by Felix M. McWhirter of Indianapolis, a member of the chamber's committee on federal taxation, the program calls for a total tax cut of \$394,000,000, more than \$100,000,000 higher than that recommended by the house and nearly \$200,000,000 above that now suggested as safe by the treasury.

The proposals, first submitted to the house ways and means committee last November, and now repeated, call:

- Reduction of the corporation income tax to not more than 10 per cent.
- Repeal of the remaining war excise taxes on particular businesses.
- Repeal of the federal inheritance tax.

The administration is in partial agreement with this program, but differs widely with the proposed cut in the corporation levy. It now favors a reduction from 13 1/2 to only 12 per cent. The house has proposed a 11 1/2 per cent rate.

Points to War Record
Mr. McWhirter said that nothing had developed in the last four months to cause the chamber to change its position; that the recommendation of its membership at the beginning of the war for heavier and drastic taxation was "consistent with its position today for repeal of those war-time measures," and that it always had been an outstanding advocate of "property budgetary procedure in the fiscal operations of the government."

McWhirter took exception to official estimates on corporation returns and back taxes and said the chamber could prove that its recommendations for cuts in 1925 and 1929, if accepted, would "still leave ample funds for statutory debt requirements and a 1929 year-end surplus in excess of \$229,000,000 or a \$69,000,000 surplus even under continued use on debt retirement of \$160,000,000 of foreign interest payments."

Exception was also taken to official estimates of receipts and expenditures for the last five years. McWhirter declaring that receipts invariably were underestimated and expenses over-estimated.

Expense: Over-Estimated
Pointing out that official estimates had placed corporation tax collections for the fiscal year 1927 at \$1,120,000,000 and that the same figure had been calculated for this and next fiscal years, McWhirter said it has now become evident that the tax liability shown by corporations upon their 1927 returns will "not vary substantially" from that of 1926 when the taxes due were at least \$1,242,000,000.

"In other words," he added, "regardless of the nature of the income tax, and the undoubted growth in the volume of business, a 'fixed' estimate is used for the receipts from sources yielding a good third of the total revenue receipts of the government. It would seem reasonable to assume that, granted that business conditions in 1928 calendar year remain in general at a parity with those of 1927, receipts in 1929 fiscal year from current corporation tax at a rate of 13 1/2 per cent would exceed the official estimate of \$1,120,000,000 by at least \$100,000,000."

Pointing to the \$321,000,000 in back taxes collected in 1927, McWhirter called attention to the estimate of \$229,000,000 in this category for the fiscal year 1929 and said this did not seem reasonable to the chamber.

"The official statements," he said, "would seem to mean that in the \$229,000,000 now estimated as receipts from 'back taxes' in 1929 fiscal year there are \$100,000,000 of these delinquent 'current' taxes."

A table was presented to show that actual surpluses have exceeded estimates made only six months before the close of each fiscal year in amounts ranging from \$100,000,000 year to nearly \$600,000,000 in the last year, \$252,000,000.

'The Rough Riders' is One of Screen's Finest

One of the Screen's Best Pictures Coming to the Parade on Friday and Saturday.

In the years that have followed the charge of Roosevelt's Rough Riders under a withering fire up San Juan Hill the valor of that broken line of men has been precious to the hearts of all men, women and children. Every American should see "The Rough Riders," which will be shown at the Parade Theatre Friday and Saturday nights for the glory of this one scene alone which Paramount has reproduced so vividly.

Fiercely, with tigerish fury—in a way to strike terror to the bosom of the bravest foe—the picture shows the rushing madmen leaping toward the Spanish guns. They are following a battle-flag of polka-dot blue—a kerchief soaked with sweat that shields the neck of Theodore Roosevelt from the blistering heat of the sun.

On an elevation is a red-tiled ranch house, now known as Kettle Hill, and from it comes blast after blast of iron death. A simple thing, after all, to the decisive mind of T. R. His men are aligned in a jagged area. Before them is an open basin and up on the crest a hut with a straight trench in front of it.

Roosevelt swings his hat and gives the order to charge. His pony, Texas, leaps forward. Behind him comes a cheering line of steel-lavod fighters, their faces streaked with dirt. He waves his sword and the flash is a beacon of courage. Mauder bullets whine through the tall grass, stinging like deadly darts.

A barbed wire fence forty yards from the top halts Roosevelt. He dismounts and flings himself over it. The Rough Riders come on furiously in the assault. Aligned with them are the brave, black regulars of the Ninth Cavalry, a colored regiment that never knew the word fear.

There is an inundation of the trenches as the Rough Riders swarm up, heedless of a rain of fire from the Spaniards' second line of defense. To the left, General Keat's division storms the San Juan blockhouse. Roosevelt swings the fire of his troops on the Spanish defenders and the blockhouse is captured.

"Come on, boys," says Roosevelt and his men charge across a wide valley to the farther hill of San Juan. Bullets sing around them, over them—often through them. On they go, on to another row of hills overlooking Santiago, unbending the enemy's machine gun fire. It takes a severe order to stop them from following the foe clear into the fortified city.

A wave of adulation for Roosevelt sweeps over the United States the next day when press and public herald his victorious feat.

The heroes who took part in that unbelievably courageous charge are represented in the picture which Victor Fleming directed, by such sterling actors as Charles Farrell,

Charles Emmett Mack, Noah Berry, George Baneroff and Fred Kopper, in the principal roles. Frank Kopper is an admirable Roosevelt, leading his men with a spirit as nearly akin to that of the redoubtable T. R. as possible. Fred Lindsay portrays with military distinction the role of Leonard Wood.

B. P. Schulberg, associate Paramount producer, supervised this production. The original story was written by Herman Hagedorn, Roosevelt's biographer and secretary of the Roosevelt Memorial Association.

BERGER PARTY CHAIRMAN

New York, April 15.—Delegates to the national convention of the socialist party, in session today, unanimously elected Representative Victor L. Berger, of Wisconsin, as national chairman of the party. James H. Maurer, of Reading, Pa., president of the Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor, was elected chairman of the day.

An appropriation of \$3,500 for organization of the socialist young people throughout the country, was voted by the delegates, after a report on activities of the Young People's Socialist League had been read by Aaron Parker, national secretary of the league.
