CREEKS AT FLOOD STAGE
From Saturday's Daily—
The travelers over the King of Trails highway from the south last evening reported that the Weeping Water creek had a greater volume of water than it had earlier in the flood stage and at Union the water was near the floor of the bridge located just west of the town of Union and that the creek, which is usually a very placid stream, was a raging torrent and the heavy rains over the past few days had caused the creek to rise to the greatest height this season and threatening to overflow the lowlands adjoining the creek.

The Pappio creek near Fort Crook was still on the rampage last evening and during the afternoon the creek rose to a greater volume of water than it had earlier in the morning and was covering hundreds of acres of the low land and flowing over the wagon bridge of the K. of T. highway.
