# King George Takes a Turn for the Worse

Medical Bulletin Declares Sovereign Spent Bad Day; Alarm in England Rearoused

London, Nov. 26 .- (11:30 P. M.)-The king's physicians, Sir Stanley Hewitt and Lord Dawson of Penn, were recalled to Buckingham palace just before 11 o'clock tonight and are still with the king.

London, Nov 26 .- At 8:30 this evening Sir Stanley Hewitt and Lord Dawson of Penn, the king's physicians, issued their second bulletin of the day,

'The king has not had a comfortable day. His temperature is now 101.6, but the pleurisy has not extended further and his strength is maintained."

London, Nov. 26 .- Offsetting the somewhat unfavorable bulletin as to the condition of King George, issued by his physicians, Sir Stanley Hewitt and Lord Dawson of Penn, this forenoon, it is unofficially learned tonight that the king has made "satisfactory progress" during the day.

While the king's physicians, in government this afternoon declared

Anxiety Again Felt The British public, however, which

yesterday rejoiced at news declaring the king out of all danger, exhibited plain anxiety again today as the impression gained ground that the king's illness is not yielding to the treatment.

It was noted that the two famous doctors arrived at Buckingham palace an hour earlier than usual this mornleft together an hour later, and held a consultation with Sir William Joynson-Hicks, the home secretary, before issuing their bulletin.
