With 1,100,000,000 bushels of wheat in sight there will be a surplus of approximately 300,-000,000 bushels, which must be taken care of by exports or a foreign market. The grain is now beginning to pour into the various elevators and there is a congestion.

J. Gallmeier of Fort Wayne, in which he assailed killings during prohibition enforcement raids.

"Lutherans," he declared, "believe in regulation through Christian influences and not through a police:
