## OUR SOUTH AMERICAN TRADE

About so often references are made to our business connections with Central and South American countries, accompanied with injunctions that if trade with those countries is desired, it must be looked after. There is a certain amount of business that will come to us under normal conditions, but that is not satisfying, and for an increase, our country must do more or less missionary work. Foreign nations enjoy this American trade in the higher brackets because they work for it and pay more attention to the native need and transportation methods, but this does not prevent us from following the same methods, and on this line there is no reason we should not do just the same. In truth, our exporters may do well to pursue foreign procedures in the handling of their shipments and looking up business. However, despite our shortcomings, there has been, according to a Boston dispatch, a gratifying increase in our exports to South American countries since the first of the year, all the more welcome because unexpected.

The following telegram from Boston of a late date tells a pleasing story, and as that city is not given to the sensational, it may be accepted:

"South America continues its phenomenal expansion as a market for products of the United States, but still buys only one-third as much as the British empire."

"Banking and official figures indicate that exports to South American countries are running 50 per cent ahead of last year and will form approximately a tenth of the total for the year."

"Meanwhile, two-fifths of all United States exports are flowing to various parts of the British empire."

"Canada, England, Scotland and Ireland alone account for a third of the total during January, February and March. Bankers consider it a noteworthy fact that anxious discussions proposed changes in the United States tariff schedules, which have featured the foreign press and politics of the past few months, have not checked the flow of exports."

"Imports from abroad, particularly South America, are coming in greater volume than last year but not sufficient to neutralize the rise in exports."

"The excess of exports last year amounted to 1,109,000,000 and estimates based on figures for the first quarter of 1929 indicate that the excess may reach \$1,500,000 this year."

There is a great field southward, and by intelligent work, and more care in complying with native needs and conditions, our exports can be largely increased.

## SAVING THE FARM CHILDREN

The anti-tobacco crusade, starting modestly among grown men and women, now seems ready for extension to the boys and girls. If the W. C. T. U. acts on the warning and suggestion of one of its Wisconsin leaders. She urges a fight against allowing the youthful members of the 4-H clubs to raise tobacco, with the novel reasoning that children who plant the filthy weed, care for it and watch it grow, naturally will suffer a weakening of moral fiber until they descend to smoking the stuff, despite all their parents can do to prevent it. She would avert a great national peril by having the young farmers confine themselves to crops not so likely to contaminate them.

But to what farm products can the energetic young 4-H clubbers turn so they may avoid temptation?

The waving fields of grain must be strictly taboo, of course, for are there not the source of malt and spirituous liquors? The fragrant grape is quite obviously a demon in disguise. Then, too, the innocent boy might be tempted to smoke dried grapevine as conks and thus be led to dally with Lady Nicotine. The orchard must be padlocked to the young agriculturalist, for drafts of forbidden potencies are obtained from the plum, the peach, the apricot and the apple. Even the humble potato can be made to yield a heady liquor, so the culture of the spud may be a step on the downward path. Sorghum and sugar cane are simply lying in wait to get their clutches on the young.

Our boys and girls will do well to beware of all these perils. Nothing seems left to them but to plant a few acres in cowpeas and squashes, hope for prize at the county fair, drink plenty of buttermilk and stay away from the silo.
