SPEEDING THROUGH TOWNS

The practice of inconsiderate motorists to speed through small towns on the main highways of the state is a matter of serious consequence to everyone interested in the protection of life and property, and is especially of concern to those living in the towns.

Most of the small towns of Nebraska are located on some frequently traveled highway which usually runs through the main street of the town. Motorists, driving at a high rate of speed, seem to ignore the necessity for slowing down in passing through these places, thus causing much apprehension to the inhabitants as well as endangering life.

When a person in the town seeks to turn into the main street or to cross it, he never knows when the driver of a high-powered automobile may race by, apparently oblivious of the fact that he is passing through a town.

The towns have a speed limit, but this is frequently ignored. It is almost impossible for the town officers to curb the speeding out-of-town drivers for the reason that they are not equipped with motorcycles.

Many of these racing motorists speed through towns without thinking and would be glad to slow down if they were made to realize the possible danger to life. Others will never cease their practice until they are penalized.

The proposed work consists of constructing 0.7 miles of graded road. The approximate quantities are: 25,000 cu. yds. Unclassified Excavation; 40,000 cu. yds. Stations Overhaul; 11,000 sq. yds.
