"The problems of rural life, numerous and baffling as they are, may be solved by education and probably by it alone," Professor Lancelot said. "Of course, our school system has solving the vexing problem, and this notwithstanding that it could solve it more easily than the schools of any other nation could meet a simicountry in which free high schools

"The reason for the failure of the schools to play the part they should is that it has not been required of them. They were established, not to minister to rural children, but to those who live in the towns and cities. Only recently has the enrollment of country boys and girls become really large. Yet it is large now and if proper pressoure were applied we should see our high school going about the business of training for rural life with a zeal that could hardly fail to bring about a genuine renaissance of country life in America."
