FAIR PROGRESS IN PLOWING

Huron, S. D .- Altho retarded by rain, snow and wet soil, South Dakota farmers made fair progress on plowing for corn and seeding small Nullifying Acts grain during the week ending Monday, according to a report issued by the weather bureau.
