Sen. Wheeler Has Renounced Prohibition

Heretofore a Dry Leader. He is Convinced Dry Law a Failure-Favors State Regulation

Washington, Sept. 12 .- Senator Burton K. Wheeler (Mont., dem.). ranked among the drys in congress, issued a statement today saying: "I voted for prohibition in

Montana because I felt that the old saloon was a curse to the American people and I wanted to do away with it. In the old days the breweries in many instances owned the fixtures, the buildings and the license and in many instances controlled local politics.

"I am no more in favor of the saloon, no more in favor of the sale of liquor today than I was before but under prohibition you have in many cities more dives and speakeasies where they are openly selling rotton whisky than you had in the old days. Today in many communities, the bootlegger is becoming a greater political power and has more influence than the old time saloon keeper, as evidenced by the fact that he is able to reach many of our higher officials. He is generally a much lower type of citizen. He has had a frightful social, moral and political life.

"In view of the fact that this administration and the previous administration have apparently been helpless in stamping out the evil I am reluctantly forced to the oppinion that national prohibition is a failure and that each state should be left to regulate the liquor traffic as a majority of its citizens deem ad-
