Contracts for the Grading and Paving of Highway From Union to Nebraska City Soon

The contracts for the grading and paving of highway No. 75 from Union south to Nebraska City looks good for this fall according to F. H. Klietsch, division engineer of the state department of public works, visited in Nebraska City Friday.

"The department of public works of Nebraska is anxious to have all contracts for 1931 projects let as soon as possible in order that work As Small as \$500 and \$1000 Sums may be provided for laborers during the winter months and thus help out the unemployment situation," Kleitsch stated.
