The stockholders shall become individually responsible for the liability hereby imposed, immediately after any such banking corporation, or banking institution shall be adjudged insolvent, and the receiver of said corporation or institution shall have full right and lawful authority, as such receiver, forthwith to proceed by action in court to collect such liabilities; and the provisions of Section 4, Article XII, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska shall not be construed as applying to banking corperations or banking institu-

"FOR amendment to the Constitution fixing individual liability of stockholders in banking corporations or banking institutions, and providing for the immediate collection of such liability upon the failure of such banking corporations or banking institutions," and

"AGAINST amendment to the Constitution fixing individual liability of stockholders in banking corporations or banking institutions and providing for the immediate collection of such liability upon the failure of such banking corporations or banking institutions."
