WORK NOT CHARITY

President William Green of the American Federation of Labor seems to have hit the nail squarely on the head when he remarked that his organization would prefer steady jobs to unemployment insurance.

It is only a step from compulsory unemployment insurance to dole, he told an interviewer recently. "The best, the real remedy for unemployment is employment. We want jobs, not charity."

Mr. Green believes that this goal can be reached through the establishment of shorter working days and shorter working weeks and through a systematic balancing of production with demand, which would eliminate what is called cynical unemployment.

There is sound sense in that. Unemployment insurance is only a palliative. Mr. Green is right in preferring a remedy that goes to the roots of the matter.

THE CAPONE CHAIN

The plight of gangsters under arrest on a kidnaping charge afford cause for gossip that Al Capone, the Beeg Boy, proposes to extend his sway to St. Louis and the nearby cities in Illinois. Capone was attracted back to Chicago by the elimination of competition and the opportunity to exercise monopoly of rum remunerative law breaking practice and he has a chance now to "muscle in" in St. Louis.

The Italian gangsters of St. Louis committed the crime of which they are accused in East St. Louis, and they are under the jurisdiction of the officers of St. Clair county. The bond of three has been fixed at \$57,500 each, a total of \$172,000, and, if this is set for the others, the totals will be \$287,000. Friends of the accused have been unable to raise the money or procure the bonds, and it is said that they have appealed to Capone for relief.

Crime is a branch of big business. It would be too much to expect Capone to take any risk with or for the St. Louis gangsters without assurance of gain, and it is certain that by helping these fellows he could become boss of a strong arm of the St. Louis bunch. So, it is possible. Capone being in the mood, that the chain system which has featured other lines of commerce will be tried out in the gang world.

America is moving into a cycle of its social and economic development in which we can expect nothing beyond a tragic insecurity if we entrust the guidance of our economic and political order to the tradition-bound mind.
