salt may be mixed together. This amount will balance pounds of yellow corn meal, 400 pounds of ground wheat, 200 pounds of bran, and 200 pounds of pulverized oats or barley to make a ton of laying mash for hens.

Hens getting this mash in a self feeder should be given from 8 to 10 pounds of whole wheat per 100 hens per day. Most people like to scatter the whole wheat in a straw or other litter, which is a good practice provided the litter is clean.


