#### **Better Prices** for Nebraska Farm Land

\$200 an Acre Activity Is Shown

Three sales at more than two hundred dollars an acre, and two others at prices just under this figure, were reported by Dodge county in recent Nebraska farmland transfers announced by the Nebraska Mortgage Bankers' association.

A quarter section northwest o Fremont brought \$245 an acre, and a quarter section just east of Hooper \$225 an acre. For two hundred acres south of Snyder, \$227 an acre was paid.
