Lincoln, Neb., June 12 .- The republican organization in the house of representatives had fairly smooth sailing Friday and succeeded in adding approximately 363 thousand dollars to the governor's budget.

The largest increase was 200 thousand dollars for highway maintenance. This money comes out of the gasoline tax rather than from property taxes. Another 73 thousand dol-lars was added to the item providing for highway construction. This also comes from the gasoline tax and represents only a difference between the governor's and committee's estimate of what will be available from that ource for expenditure.
