

TO TAG BASS AND CATFISH

Bass and catfish that frequent Nebraska lakes and streams will be tagged, starting this fall, Frank O'Connell, head of the state game, parks and forestation commission, announced Wednesday.

Tiny metal tags, bearing the name 'Nebraska" and a serial number will be placed on 10,000 catfish and bass to be planted in Nebraska streams and lakes in the fall. Only nursery stock will be so marked. The tag is clipped to the gill of the fish.
