**Caraway, Fiery Senate Democrat Leader, is Dead**

**End Is Sudden After Operation; No Alarm Had Been Felt—Was a Friend of the Farmer**

Little Rock, Ark., Nov. 6.—Thaddeus H. Caraway, forceful United States senator and democrat of the first rank, died suddenly tonight in a hospital here. Death was caused by closing of arteries which feed the heart.

The senator underwent an operation October 29 and his recovery appeared certain. At no time was his physician alarmed at his condition. He was 60 years old and in the height of his life. He was a hearty and happy conversationalist with his wife preceded by only a few minutes his sudden complaint of "terrible pains."

He bitterly attacked Albert B. Fall for his leasing of the Teapot Dome oil reserve and severely criticized President Coolidge for vetoing the revised McNary-Haugen farm relief bill which Senator Caraway had helped rewrite.

**Supporter of Wilson.**  
Caraway, riding into the senate on the record of his predecessor, sought re-election as a strong supporter of Woodrow Wilson and his opponent was easily defeated.

**NOVEMBER MISSION MEETING**

**CHRISTIAN SCIENCE**

The sharp distinction between spiritual man, described in the opening chapter of Genesis, and mortal man, the outcome of a mist or mortalization spoken of in the second and later chapters is shown by Christian Science in the lesson-sermon for Sunday, November 8th, "Adam and Fallen Man."

Paul, the apostle, proclaimed the spiritual man in a passage from Romans, (8:1-2) which is a part of the lesson-sermon: "There is now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the spirit. For the law of the spirit of life in Christ Jesus has made me free from the law of sin and death."

A conclusive passage from the Christian Science textbook reads: "It is only by acknowledging the supremacy of spirit, which annuls the claims of matter, that mortals can lay off mortality and find the indissoluble spiritual link which establishes man forever in the divine likeness (Inseparable from his creator." (Science and Health, p. 491.)

**CONGRESSMAN OF TEXAS DIES**

Washington, Nov. 6.—The death of Representative Wursbach, only Republican member of the house from Texas, strengthened the probability of Democratic organization of the house next month.

With the Texas' passing, the lineup Friday stood: Democrats, 217; Republicans, 214; Farmer-Labor, 1; vacancies, 3.

One of these vacancies, caused by the death of Representative Ackerman (R.), New Jersey, will be filled before congress convenes, but it is hardly possible for Texas to hold a special election and send another Republican to Washington before Dec. 7, the convening date.

The third vacancy is in New Hampshire, but this formerly Republican seat will not be filled until several weeks after congress convenes.

The death of Wursbach, who would have begun his sixth consecutive term next month had he lived, was the 14th among members of the new house.

Wursbach was born at San Antonio on May 19, 1874, and was admitted to the Texas bar in 1896. He served with Company F of the First Texas Infantry in the Spanish-American war. Wursbach was elected to congress in 1921.

**CONTINUE RIP RAPPING**

The force of workmen of the Yant Construction Co., which has the contract for the rip-rapping of the river bank at the point where the pipelines of the Continental Construction Co., goes under the waters of the Missouri river, have been very busy for the past week.

Following this rip work, the men laying from three and a half to four and a half cars a day.

Where the transportation of the rock is easy a great deal faster time can be made, then men Friday placing four and a half cars of rock on the rip-rap.

The crushed rock is shipped here via the Burlington, some forty cars having already been sent in here and a large number of additional cars will be used in making the bank safe for the protection of the pipeline in case of high water or ice gorges in the spring.

**LENIENCY IS SUGGESTED**

New York—Claude R. Porter of Iowa, member of the interstate commerce commission, told an audience at the Brooklyn law school that in his opinion the commission should be more lenient in maintenance of cumbersome "feeder" lines by railroads. Competition by trucking companies and the use of pipe lines, he said, had forced many railroads to maintain the feeder lines at a heavy loss.

"The outcome to the railroads of competition by airplanes, and motor trucks," he said, "is unpredictable at present."
