Conditions never are wice alike. In 1890 and again in 1910 the country was highly wrought up against Republican tariff legislation, and the Democrats profited in he next presidential elections. In 1894 there were violent dissensions within the Democratic party over ree silver and McKinley triumphed wo years later.
