NEW GOLF BALL RECEIVES APPROVAL OF AMATEUR GROUP

Pinehurst, N. C .- The new golf ball, which after Jan. 1 will be the official tournament play ball of the United States Golt association, was given unanimous and emphatic approval after the medal play of the annual mid winter tournament here by the first field of amateurs to play the remodeled sphere.

Dick Wilson of Southern Pines, the medalist, said the ball overcomes all objections raised against the light ball, which is going into the discard. The present ball is 1.68 inches in diameter and weighs 1.55 ounces. The new one togins the old diameter but the weight has been increased to 1 62 cunces.

"The extra weight," Wilson said, "has imparted much more stability in the wind, and has improved the ball's putting qualities considerably.
