allegiance, with no apparent reason, produced sufficient confusion. But now that both the recent Tardieu and Laval ministries seem to have recognized a corresponding authority as being vested in the senate, the chances of future governments are even more unsettled.

Under the French system there are no fewer than a dozen parties in the chamber of deputies and about half as many is the senate. None of these possesses a majority and a government, in order to function, now must have a combination of parties behind it in both houses. But, with one or two exceptions, the parties in the senate do not correspond to those in the chamber and are not nationally organized. The result is a Chinese puzzle for the man called to form a ministry; because he must be able not only to work out a compromise program among his support ing parties but to satisfy them with

the right number of ministerial posts. It is evident that this system, es pecially now that the senate is being taken into account, demands political jugglery of a high order. It will be interesting to see how M Laval's successor will manage, in view of the fact the former premier is reported still to have a majority in the chamber of deputies. But whatever happens in France's domestic affairs, there is little likelihood of any considerable change in her foreign policy. That is certain to continue cautious and nationalistic.
