Broad Sales Tax Proposed by Banning

With the income tax bill backed by Senator Frank McCarter (dem.) of Bayard and the sales tax by Senator W. B. Banning (dem.) of Union, a contest on the two schemes loomed as a major issue.

What he calls general "privilege tax" to be levied on the sale of goods and services and the earnings of individuals derived from business or professional occupations or working trades is proposed in a bill which Senator W. B. Banning (d) of Union said he will introduce today. It carries the emergency clause.

The measure is modeled in large part on the sales tax law of Mississippi. Rates of taxation are fixed varying from one-half of 1 per cent up to 21/2 per cent of the gross receipts of various enterprises, firms and persons. The following concerns, however, are exempt:


