Firemen Have Severe Time in the Cold

Number of Volunteer Firemen Affected by the Gruelling Ordeal of the Wohlfarth Fire.

 The members of the Plattsmouth fire department Tuesday demonstrated their Spartan courage as they battled for practically the entire day the fire that eventually destroyed the Paul Wohlfarth home on North Sixth street.

The figures of the firemen resembled icebergs as they stood hour after hour with only brief reliefs, battling with the elements of destruction, the water that fell on them turning to ice in an instant, while the bitter and strong wind beat unmercifully on the faces of the men. No highly paid or trained department fought more courageously than these local men who had laid down their usual daily vocations to join in the fight to save a home and property of one of their fellow citizens.

The firemen were served hot coffee throughout the day at the August Cloidt home near the scene of the fire which proved a real boon to the cold and tired firemen and a fire was arranged in a shed at which the firemen were able to snatch a few moments during the day to try and dry their ice covered clothing.

A large number suffered frost bitten fingers and ears as the result of the hard fight, while Fulton Harris, civil engineer and son of Mr. and Mrs. Creed Harris of Union, was probably the most severely injured by the cold. The face of Mr. Harris was almost frozen and it was necessary to have him taken to the office of a physician for treatment. Carl Ofe, who just recently recovered from an illness was also one of those who suffered severely from the cold and had to be taken from the scene of the fire.

The firemen were again called to the scene of the fire last night when a blaze broke out in the ruins of the Wohlfarth home and which was extinguished to prevent spreading to other properties.

The members of the department last night were entertained at a lunch at the dining room of the Brown cafe and where the regular monthly meeting was held.
