If farmers who grew any wheat in the base years of 1930-31-32 can see where the allotment plan may benefit them it will pay them to come to one of the above filing places and talk over their individual problem with the representative. The meetings will be from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m.

### WATER BONDS CARRY

In the special election held Tuesday, the village of Louisville voted the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$6,300, which will be used for the maintaining and extending of the water mains of the village plant, for public use and fire protection.

The bonds are to become due twenty years after date of issuance but are payable any time after five years.

The bonds carried by a large vote, there being 226 cast in favor of the bonds and 51 against the issue. Sixty per cent of the vote cast is necessary for the carrying of the measure.
