





hog buying. Norris questioned the advisability of making beef a "basic commodity"

under the agricultural adjustment act in order to adjust production thru payment of benefits. "There is danger in classifying too many products as basic commodities," he contended. "Some people would put all products in that class and the adjustment administration would topple over from its own weight."

Representative Burke, Nebraska, said he believes beef should be included under that act "and it should have been a basic commodity from the old, weight 2,750 lbs. start." He said cattle producers now favor it.
