# Small Incomes Tax May be

to Be Asked-Bill Is Now Being Drafted.

Washington, Jan. 24 .- in upward revision of the normal income tax rate on small incomes may be recommended to congress within the next week by the house ways and means committee in a tax bill which has the support of the treasury department, it was learned today.

Accompanying the proposal of an increase in the normal rate will be a recommendation that income tax payers be allowed a deduction for earned income so that the net effect of the ax increases will be to emphasize the burdent carried by unearned income such as dividends, interest and investment profits.
