Health and Nutrition Center for Plattsmouth

Project Authorized Under the CWS Is Approved for This City—Location Being Sought.

 Mrs. C. A. Rosencrans, who has had charge of the CWS work in Cass county was notified by wire today that this point has been granted a nutrition and health center project as a part of the relief program.
 This will provide for the care and feeding of undernourished children, giving them at least one meal a day as well as physical inspection and diet training. Under it there is provision made for one custodian, one cook, seamstress, director nurse and three assistants who will carry on the work of the project.
 Mrs. Rosencrans is arranging to find a location where the health center may be located and where the work may be carried on during the life of the project. Those who are employed will be selected from those on relief or unemployed, as this is mandatory.

WOMAN FOR GOVERNOR

Mrs. A. F. Nuquist of Osceola, is being urged to become a democratic candidate for governor of Nebraska. The movement to place a woman on the primary ballot is said to have started in Lincoln among women and men who vouch for the ability of Mrs. Nuquist. The proposal has been submitted to her but her answer has not been received. Mrs. Nuquist is past president of the Nebraska Federation of Women's Clubs and is now chairman of the Past President's association, a position she is holding for a term of two years. It is believed no woman has been a candidate for governor since the early prohibition days when Nebraska women were not backward about running for president of the United States on a dry ticket. Mrs. Nuquist is the daughter of J. W. Edgerton, deceased, who was prominent in the populist political party and was secretary of the state board of transportation, predecessor of the present railway commission.
