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Thomas F. Jamison, 76. Had Been One of Prominent Men of County—Dies at Rising City.

The death of Thomas F. Jamison, 76, resident of Weeping Water for a period of fifty years, occurred on Saturday afternoon at 4:40 at Rising City, Nebraska, where he had been making his home for some time with his daughter, Mrs. John Bates.

The news of his death came as a great shock to the old friends over Cass county where he was well and favorably known, as he had been one of the active business leaders in his community.

Mr. Jamison was a contractor and builder and most of the buildings and residences in Weeping Water and vicinity have been erected by him in his long residence in that city.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. John Bates, Rising City; Mrs. Margaret Brendel, Lincoln; Mrs. William Kidder, Sargent, Nebraska. Mrs. Jamison preceded her husband in death several years ago.

The funeral services will be held at 2:30 Tuesday at the Methodist church at Weeping Water and will be conducted by the Masonic lodge of Weeping Water of which he was a member for fifty years.

He was married during his residence there, three children and the wife surviving his passing. The funeral and burial was held at his late home in that part of the state. The many old friends here will regret to learn of his death.

Dies After Short Illness

Gile Albert Stoll, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas E. Fulton and H. H. Stoll, was born at Nehawka on September 10, 1907. He attended the public schools here and with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Stoll, moved to Wayside, Nebraska, where he completed his education and where he resided until some two years ago, when he returned to Nehawka on account of the feeble health of his grandfather, Thomas E. Fulton, and has made his home here with the grandparents.

Of late, the young man had been employed in the stone quarries, and it was while engaged at this work that he contracted pneumonia, passing away on last Friday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fulton.

The funeral of the young man was held from the Methodist church at Nehawka and was conducted by the Rev. W. A. Taylor, of Union, with interment in the beautiful Mt. Pleasant cemetery.

Gile was an exemplary young man and had a host of friends. He leaves to mourn his departure his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Stoll and the grandparents, Messrs. and Mesdames Thomas E. Fulton and H. H. Stoll, a brother Gilbert and sister, Mrs. Lovina Osborne and their little daughter, Harold Kimlon, wife and their little ones. The entire community mourns at the untimely removal of this splendid young man and sympathizes with the relatives in their loss. He was 26 years, 6 months and 13 days old at the time of his passing.
