Wednesday night there swept over the city a vast swarm of grasshoppers, they being apparently of the variety that has caused so much damage in past years in South Dakota and northern Nebraska.

While an increasing number of the hoppers has been noticed for several days, the swarm that visited Nebraska City this city last night was so numerous that they attracted immediate atten-

In the business section of the city the front of various places of business were covered with the grasshoppers and this morning hundreds

The grasshoppers are not the yellow winged type usually found here but have a pink like wing and those familiar with the plague of hoppers in other sections pronounce them of the crop eating variety.
