In the northern tier of states millet would probably outyield Sudan grass, but as a hay Suden grass is preferable, just as the forage sorghums are preferable to corn as a roughage, all conditions being equal. Forae sorghums. millet and Sudan rass probably would make a better yield at this late planting and under drought conditions, it planted in rows, rather than broadeast. This gives an opportunity for cultivation, takes less seed, keeps down weeds and conserves soil moisture.

A committee of hay, feed and seed men in the U.S. Department of Agriculture has recommended the "purchase of adapted seed when conditions warrant planting, such purchases to include the seed of corn, forage corghums and such seed of millet, Sudan grass and adapted soybeans as may be available. Turnips, rutabagas and such garden crops should be included. It is inadvisable to make immediate large purchases of seed."
