Mrs. George W. Holdrege Dies at Omaha Home

Wife of Pioneer Railroad Leader and Well Known to Large Number in Plattsmouth.

Mrs. George W. Holdrege, widow of the former general manager of the Burlington railroad, died Tuesday night at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. A. Holyoke, 411 No. 40th St., Omaha, where she made her home. Mrs. Holdrege who was 78, had been ill a month.

Mrs. Holdrege was a pioneer resident of Nebraska, having lived here 65 years. Most of the time she lived in Omaha. After coming to Nebraska in 1869, she was married to Mr. Holdrege, who was an official of the Burlington for many years. The town of Holdrege, Neb., was named for Mr. Holdrege, who died in 1926.

Surviving Mrs. Holdrege, besides Mrs. Holyoke, are three other children, H. A. Holdrege, Mrs. R. R. Hollister, and Miss Leeta Holdrege, all of Omaha; a brother, Thomas R.
