To put it in scientific language, "the function of vitamin A in the human body is to maintain the integrity of the epithelial tissues" ... and those tissues are linings. As an extra protection for them we give to the children and often to ourselves, likewise. either cod-liver or halibut-liver oil. which are exceedingly rich in vitamin A that comes apparently from carotene in the green sea plants the fishes eat.


