

Claim Tuition Law of State is Clearly Invalid

State Superintendent Taylor's Attorneys Object to Diverting School Funds.

Attorneys for State Superintendent Taylor filed a brief Friday with the supreme court in which he asked a declaratory judgment as to the constitutionality of H. R. 445. This is a law which provides that school districts which supply tuition to children of officers and men of the army, navy and marine corps may, upon making claim, be reimbursed out of the temporary school fund, which distributes a million more or less every year to school districts, the money representing earnings of the permanent school fund and income from state lands. The law fixes reimbursement at \$1 a week for grade and \$3 a week for high school students in this class. The test case involves the Lincoln school district.

The state superintendent takes the position that the law is invalid because it diverts this income to uses other than those detailed in the constitution and provides for an inequitable distribution of funds. His attorneys say it is also a special law, prohibited by the constitution, and makes an arbitrary classification. There is nothing to prevent parents of these

children becoming citizens of the state, and that being true, their treatment should be that of all other school children.

They point out that their situation is no different from that of state officers whose duties compel them to reside at the state capital, although retaining their legal residence in other districts, and the supreme court has held that the Lincoln district must supply them with school facilities. They argue that the legislature might with as much reason and as good legal logic provide that the educational costs of children of republicans or democrats or socialists should be paid out of the state temporary school fund. They point out also that all school districts are compelled to furnish free tuition to children of indigent parents, persons who pay no taxes whatever, and that the position of the children favored in this law is no different. With as much reason their tuition might be ordered paid out of state funds.

MADISON SAILOR DROWNS

Madison, Neb.—Jesse C. Basse, of Madison said he had received a telegram from Washington stating that his son, William, 21, was lost overboard from the U. S. S. He visited his parents here in June on a leave of absence.

High School Students Have Fine Program

Harry Cooper, Secret Service Operative Is Feature on Convocation Program Tuesday.

The high school enjoyed one of the most interesting and educational convocations of the year yesterday morning when the student council presented Mr. Harry Cooper, operative in charge of the Secret Service office in Omaha, and Miss Jane Boedecker as piano soloist and Mr. L. L. Starrett as vocal soloist.

Mr. Cooper has been a member of the Secret Service of the United States for fifteen years during which time he has served with the service in guarding Wilson, Harding, Coolidge and Roosevelt. He has charge of the area comprising, Nebraska, South Dakota, Iowa and part of Colorado.

For forty minutes, Mr. Cooper held the close attention of the student body as he related in a most pleasing and effective manner the origin, work and requirements of the Secret Service and of the chief functions of the service in guarding the life of the president and his family and in tracking down counterfeiters and others engaged in illicit traffic. His description of the Harding trip to Alaska in 1923 which ended in the death of that president was most graphically told. He brought a real message of care and observance of the law and his fine address will long be remembered by the student body. Particularly were the students appreciative of the fact that he took time from his busy life to come to Plattsmouth for this occasion.

Following his lecture at the high school, Mr. Cooper was guest speaker for the local Rotary club. The Secret Service is one division of the government that has always been enshrouded in a mist of mystery and not well understood by the general public. While Mr. Cooper is engaged in a business which sometimes becomes grim and hard yet it was a pleasure for Plattsmouth audiences to have an opportunity to learn something of this most important branch of the service and to meet personally one of the splendid type of able, courteous and intelligent men who compose it.

The addition of Jane Boedecker and Mr. Starrett to the program for the music was a happy one, with Mrs. L. S. Devos as accompanist for the latter.

'THIRD DEGREE' DECLARED

Flemington, N. J.—Bruno Richard Hauptmann's New Jersey defense attorney, Lloyd Fisher, charged the state with subjecting the Lindbergh kidnap-slaying suspect to "an insidious third degree to harass him and break down his mentality."

A grim, silent guard of state troopers and deputy sheriffs, never fewer than five, stands outside Hauptmann's cell night and day, Fisher declared, never speaking to the prisoner or to each other.

When the prisoner asks for something, the attorney said, it is handed to him without a word. When the guard is changed there are at least ten men outside Hauptmann's cell at one time.

"Hauptmann ought not to be subjected to any indignity not imposed on other prisoners held under the same charge," Fisher said, indicating he would ask Attorney General Wilentz to remove the troopers as guards.

Wilentz, informed at his Perth Amboy home of Fisher's statements, said the state police "have a right to maintain a guard."

JIM FARLEY IS GRATIFIED

New York.—Postmaster General Farley said in a statement that "the most famous figures in the republican party have been topped into oblivion" and that the new deal "has been magnificently sustained," in the off-year election.

"Returns have come in sufficiently to show the democratic party has won a wonderful victory," said Farley's statement, issued in mid-evening at national headquarters. "The figures are not yet complete enough for us to go into details as to the states we have carried, but we do know that the new deal has been magnificently sustained. Famous republican figures have been topped into oblivion. In fact we must wonder who they have left that the country ever heard of."
