Former Omaha Theater Man Serving Fifteen Years for the Deaths of Two.

N. T. Harmon, state probation officer, said the plea of Jule Rachman, former Omaha theater man, for commutation of his fifteen year sentence for the death of Harry and Sam Goldberg brothers in December 1932, after he and his father had business differences with them.
