The attorney general's opinion holds that the statute relating to He finds it is the duty of the state game commission to seize guns unlawfully used, but final forfeiture does not occur until after conviction. He says the court order should be so drawn that a proper order may be obtained. Returning the guns would in effect be remitting part of the penalty and such power is conferred only on the board of pardons, says the attorney general.
