Ever since last summer's drought investigators at the department's Arlington farm near Washington, D. C., have been doing emergency experimental work in treating seed in quantities, in testing commercial machines, and in devising better methods. Directions for treating seed grain are being published in pamphlet form and will be available to farmers in the drought areas through their county agents or through the State Extension Service. Another publication will list chemicals available for seed treatments as well as equipment for doing the work.

Treating seed has been a standard practice for some time on many farms and in some communities, but is recommended for all farmers in the drought states this year. The birthrate in the United States, the statisticians say, is falling twice as fast as that of Canada, while the rate of decline in Gemany is now four times that of France, where the statisticians explain the rate is no longer drop-

"The decline in the birthrate," the statisticians say, "extends to practically every civilized nation in the world. It has been going on for more than half a century; and the latest available data, which relate to 37 countries, and with every continent save Africa represented, show that the rapidity of the fall has been accentuated in the last five years."


