
New Deal Encroaching on State Sovereignty

This bill provides for the forced and involuntary liquidation and elimination of all gas and electric holding companies by 1940. This bill, if enacted, will have, I believe, a very serious effect, not only on utility companies, but upon the economic life of the entire nation. It is called the Anti-Utility Holding Company bill, but it goes much further than the regulation of utility holding companies. The effect of this legislation will be to destroy these

"Title two of the proposed bil! would concentrate in Washington the almost complete control of the operating electric and natural gas companies. The bill confers on the federal power commission authority over both the operation and rates of most of the operating companies. Nebraska and Iowa are states which have believed in the principle of home rule and have conferred on their city councils authority over the rates and services of utility comformer patrons of a rural route out most of these powers so that all transactions between an operating company and its customers would be in the hands of a political commission at Washington. The states and cities would be powerless to interfere with this bureaucratic control, which would cover even such matters as extensions of service, the enlargement of facilities, and rates to consumers. This could not but impair seriously the gas and electric service of the nation, which has been built up very rapidly in the last fifty years | on the basis of private initiative and investment. The real effect of the bill would be to nationalize the natural gas and electric industries.

Mr. David E Lilienthal, former member of the Wisconsin public service commission and now one of the directors of the Tennessee valley authority, summarized in 1929 the service rendered by the holding company to the light and power industry, when he said: 'The spread of rural electrification, the amazing advances in telephony, the rise of superpower systems-these and many other technological developments so intimately related to the public welfare are directly attributable to the efforts of the holding company. Perhaps most important of all, to the holding company must go the credit for the unprecedented flow of capital into the public utility indusry making possible extensions and improvements of service."

"There is no doubt that except for the financial and other assistance of the United Light & Railways company, Lincoln would have long since been deprived of a unified, well maintained transportation system; as most of the people in Lincoln, I believe, realiz that the transportation service for many years past has not paid its way, and its continued operation has been because of repeated contributions by the holding company to make up operating deficits. 
