#### NAZIS FIGHT FRATERNITIES

Berlin.-The picturesque univer sity fraternities of Germany may become only memories if the nazi regime continues its present form. In the wake of the Von Schirach decree that no Hitler youth member may continue to belong to students' "corporations" or fraternities, the German students' union issued a resolution endorsing Von Schirach's position.

The clash between nazi authorities and the fraternities began July when the famous old Borussia fraternity chapter at Heidelberg was suspended for two years because members had discussed humorously Hitler's manner of eatin gasparagus while the reichsfuehrer was delivering a serious speech in the Reichstag May 25.
