Clematis will thrive almost anywhere, if sun and soil permit. The more rampant climbers can be used on porches, pergolas, wire fences, stone walls and tree stumps. The more slender climbers, including the hybrids, can be placed next to the house on trellises or posts. Some of the less rampant kinds may be planted on the shady side of a shrub or small tree and allowed to clamber over it as they will. With ten or a
