Careful checking of the figures reveals a steady decline in tax levy every year except 1933, beginning back in the year 1929. when the depression started, and although the cuts have not been large, except last year, when \$4.20 on the \$1,000 was lopped off the high levy Plamore Park of 1933, the sum total of these reductions has brought about a considerable saving to the taxpayers.
