

### Regular Session of City Council Monday Night

City to Aid in Korn Carnival—Report of Inspection of Schools for Fire Show Excellent Rating.

The city council held their regular session Monday evening at the city hall with all the members in attendance and a great deal of routine matters to take up their attention, covering a wide range of matters.

The L. W. Egenberger agency, handlers of the city rental property, reported the sum of \$10.31 turned into the treasury after repairs and commissions.

A communication was received from residents of the vicinity of North Sixth street and avenue F, requesting that a street light be placed there. This was referred to the lighting committee.

A communication was received from Rudolph Skalak, residing on Winterset hill requesting that the alley near his place be fixed so that he might adjust his fence. This was amplified by Councilman Palmer that all residents in that section who had fences in the roadways or alleys, get them back to the lot line and then the streets, alleys and bridges committee be instructed to fix them up. This was carried unanimously.

The committee of the King Korn Carnival requested the city to lend some aid in a financial way to the forthcoming event. On motion of Bestor the sum of \$78.81 remaining in the entertainment and amusement fund, be appropriated for the Korn Carnival and this was so ordered.

Chief of Police Libershal reported for the month of August eleven arrests and fines and costs amounting to the sum of \$187.70.

City Clerk Albert Olson reported a good month for August as \$871.06 had been collected and turned over to the city treasurer.

The report of City Treasurer M. D. Brown was received and showed an excellent condition of the treasury which showed a net balance of \$12,771.95 which was deposited in the Plattsmouth State bank. The treasurer and finance committee received a fine compliment from the mayor for the new forms of reports prepared.

Mayor Lushinsky reported that the chairman of the streets, alleys and bridges committee, with the street department had cleaned up the very annoying condition on North 8th street, caused by a defective sewer and which had required five holes to be dug in the paving. Three roots growing into loose joints of the sewer as well as rags that had been thrown in sewers caused the blocking of the sewer. The mayor stated that he had asked the committee to keep time on the work and cost of material and which would be charged against the owners of the private sewer.

Mayor Lushinsky stated that he had requested the chief of the fire department to make an examination of the school buildings and the report was given by Chief Sandin as showing good fire protection and safeguards in the way of extinguishers and proper escapes and entrances to the buildings.

Police Judge C. L. Graves reported no arrests for August and fines collected from old cases of \$3.

Chairman Puls of the judiciary committee called upon City Attorney Davis for a statement as to the status of the Bauer injunction suit. Mr. Davis stating the court was expected here next week to hear the city's side of the matter as to the restraining order.

Chairman Webb of the claims committee reported that a survey of the two condemned houses on South Third street showed the cost of the city tearing them down had been too great and they had been sold for \$85 for the three of them and would be removed.

Chairman Rebal of the license committee reporting on the complaint made by members of the council as to alleged disorders at the Lamphere cafe, stated that no arrests had been made to warrant the committee in the revoking of their license, officers stating that the matter was merely a family dispute.

Chairman Bestor of the WPA committee reported that the Sixth street paving proposition had been planned and sent to headquarters of the WPA at Lincoln, also that the extension of the sewers and moving dirt projects ordered by the council would be sent in as soon as possible to get under the deadline.

Mayor Lushinsky stated that the city landscaping project had been sent in by A. L. Tidd, president of the Garden club, to the WPA. In regard to the survey work the county surveyor was busy and on drainage work he had asked J. H. McMaken to as-

assist in the establishing of the proper drain for street projects and sewerage.

Councilman Vroman brought up the matter of the danger to school children in crossing the main lines of travel to and from school, particularly on Chicago and Washington avenue where there is little attention paid to slowing up at cross streets. It was decided after some discussion to have signs painted to indicate the lines of traffic of the school children, locating them on the two avenues and near the St. John's school on North Sixth street.
