He also said the overestimating might be due to the fact the corn was extremely moist this year-as the corn crop to look bigger than it

The Chicago report said "feel sure there will not be over 25 million total of merchantable corn that is No. 4 or better." Anderson said he did not know what the word "merchantable" meant and explained that a lot of corn might be sold by one farmer to another within the state, which

Anderson's November corn estimate was 120,568,000 bushels, which is about half of normal. Most of that corn, he said, would be fed within the confines of the state and would not go on the market at all.
