ROCK ISLAND PLAN OPPOSED

Washington.—The interstate commerce commission held "prima facie impracticable" a plan for reorganization of the Rock Island railway advanced by a protective committee of the road's preferred stocks. The plan contemplated consolidation of the Rock Island with the St. Louis-San Francisco and the Chicago & Eastern Illinois rail companies.

"While the committee urges that the proposed consolidation offers many operating advantages, principally from a traffic standpoint," the commission's order said, "it is not contended that marked economies of operation will result immediately."
