# Marathon is Derailed Near Nebraska City

None Injured as Locomotive and Two Cars Leave the Tracks Near Missouri Pacific Depot.

The locomotive and two cars of the crack Marathon train of the Missouri Pacific were derailed Monday morning 200 yards north of the Missouri Pacific station at Nebraska City. Two cars of the train remained on the track.

There was no one injured in the derailment as the train was traveling only about 15 miles an hour. The air had been set for the train to coast up to the station platform.

The cars remained on their wheels but several hundred feet of the main line track as well as a part of a side track was torn up by the train.

Although no official investigation had been made, W. E. Lamb, division superintendent from Falls City, said the belief was that an engine equalizer fell, fouling the wheels on the front engine truck. Superintendent Lamb was within three miles of Nebraska City, in his motor car, when the derailment occurred. He was notified and came back to Nebraska City to take charge of operations.

The two rear passenger cars were taken to Union by an engine sent for the purpose, then to Weeping Water and south to Auburn over the "low line" through Dunbar and Talmage.

Work started at once to build a temporary track around the spot of the derailment so that other trains could get through on the main line. Mr. Lamb said he expected temporary repairs to be made within a few hours.

A switch near the point of the first derailment was caught, throwing the trucks of the cars to the rear of the engine of the tracks. The derailment took place a short distance south of the trestle over North Table creek.

Although men working in the mail car said the jar was pretty severe none was injured. Some passengers in the rear cars didn't know anything had happened, other than that there was a sudden stop.

Passengers stayed in their warm cars during the repair operations. The steam pipes from the engine weren't broken by the impact.

# HOLC FORECLOSURE SUITS

Washington.—The Home Owners' Loan corporation reported that with 32.5 percent of the principal and interest payments due it unpaid, it has instituted 3,460 foreclosure suits. An improvement in the proportion of prompt payments for nine successive months, however, was cited by the corporation as reflecting "better general business conditions and further development of loan servicing operations."

The HOLC said that as of Dec. 12, loans totaling \$2,908,517,828 had been advanced in 961,401 home owners. Of a total of 1,884,422 applications for loans, 75,193 were reported still pending. This indicated, the corporation said, that its lending operations "are now 96 percent completed, and that its main task from now on is the collection of money due each month from its borrowers."

More than half of the foreclosure proceedings which the HOLC had been obliged to institute up to Nov. 30, it was said, "are represented by 1,877 borrowers who wilfully failed to make their monthly payments which were actually within their means to pay."

Of the 3,460 foreclosures, 150 cases were halted when home owners paid up their delinquencies. The foreclosures, the corporation declared, have been at the rate of one to every 278 loans made.

# PLAN 'HOPPER CONTROL'

Iowa City, Ia.—The control of grasshopper pests by a parasite discovered in the University of Iowa zoology laboratories was called "highly probable" by Dr. R. P. Kin of the university zoology department. Tests indicate that the hoppers could be destroyed under natural conditions. Final field tests next spring and summer are expected to reveal the practicability of using the parasite called malighameba locustae, to save farmers throughout the country millions in crop losses.

# FRENCH IN WAR DRILL

Toulon, France.—An air raid drill was conducted in France's biggest Mediterranean naval base. Arsenal workers left their building when sirens sounded an alarm and took refuge in a specially designed shelter. Firemen and first aid crews went thru the maneuvers of caring for victims of an imaginary attack.
