

Fine Response in Sale of Christmas Seals in State

Miss Alpha C. Peterson, County Superintendent, Had Charge of Sales Direction in County.

Miss Alice Marshall, executive secretary of the Nebraska Tuberculosis Association, reports good progress throughout the state on the 1935 Christmas Seal Sale thus far. The exact results of the 1935 campaign to carry on next year's work in fighting tuberculosis cannot be definitely determined as yet, because a number of final reports have not yet been received.

"While great progress has been made in reducing the death toll from tuberculosis since the World war, the last five or six years of depression and want have given the disease a new hold"—says Miss Marshall in commenting on the encouraging figures given by Dr. Louis Dublin, well known national authority on vital statistics.

"Already new cases of tuberculosis are being reported due to the lowering of living standards and lack of nourishing food, the two preponderant causes in giving the disease a foothold" continues Miss Marshall. "It is therefore very gratifying to find that Nebraskans are not lulled by any sense of false security and appreciate now more than ever the need of holding the progress made by a more vigorous campaign of tuberculosis prevention. The extent of the next few years' progress in tuberculosis prevention will depend entirely on the funds realized from the sale of Christmas Seals to be used in early detection of the disease and in the intelligent prevention of its spread."

CENSURE LOUISIANA STATE

New Orleans.—The Association of American Law Schools censured Louisiana State University for what it termed "undesirable and far reaching political influence" laid to the power of the late Senator Long. After heated debate, the association, in annual convention adopted a report of its executive committee, which expressed a continued "anxious solicitude" for the L. S. U. college of law.

Frederick K. Beutel, dean of the Louisiana State school of law, vigorously defended the college against the censure, declaring there was no evidence of wrong doing and that the wrongs complained of had been corrected.

MURRAY FOR TREASURER

H. J. Murray, deputy state treasurer, has filed as a candidate to succeed State Treasurer Hall who has held the office two terms and by law is ineligible to succeed himself. A state treasurer can serve only two consecutive terms. Both Murray and Hall are democrats. Murray's home was at Franklin when he was appointed deputy state treasurer and he retains his legal residence there.

C. A. "Doc" Green of Lincoln became the first person to enter the 1936 lieutenant governor race. Green is a republican.

His filing was the first to reach the secretary of state's office for lieutenant governor in either primary.

HARVARD MAN AT HEAD

Atlanta.—Arthur N. Holcombe of Harvard university was elected president of the American Political Science association to succeed Francis W. Coker of Yale. The executive council of the organization suggested Columbus, O., as next year's meeting place, but final selection will rest with the council.

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Cass County Farm Bureau Notes

Are You a 4-H'er?
Three outstanding club members won trips to Chicago where they spent a week attending the National 4-H Club Congress, as a result of excellent work in 4-H clubs.

This is only one of the outstanding activities in which Cass county's 4-H club members are privileged to participate. Wouldn't you like to be numbered as one of these happy, busy club folks? It takes only five boys and girls, between the ages of 10 and 20 years, with a local leader in charge to form a standard 4-H club. Its time to be thinking about it now. Girls clubs are organized on a cycle basis, with certain major projects given special attention each year. The major projects in Cass county for 1936 are "Meal Planning and Preparation" and "The Room a Place to Live." Learning to Cook and Learning to Sew are suggested for beginning members.

A majority of the 4-H clubs carried on judging and demonstration work within their club, and individual members entered county and state competition. County try-outs were held in health, judging and demonstration work and style show prior to state fair. Many exhibits were entered at state fair and a total of \$132.51 was won in prizes and \$246.45 at county fair. The Cass county song group entered the state contest for groups and also the music identification contest. In addition to these activities, six 4-H club members attended Club Week in Lincoln last June and 72 attended the district 4-H club camp at Camp Brewster in July.

1936 Extension Program Formulated.

Representative groups from the women's project clubs, 4-H clubs, AAA and Farm Bureau Board laid out the plans for the 1936 extension program for Cass county at a meeting held at the Farm Bureau office last Friday.

A. G. George, extension economist from the College of Agriculture, assisted in developing the program. The group discussed the various projects that are offered by Extension Service of the College of Agriculture and placed in the program their requests for the various projects that the people of the county desire.

Woman Fins Home Accounts An Aid in Budgeting.

Keeping accounts for a year or two leads to budgeting, even if it be in a vague way as evidenced by the following statement made by one of these co-operators: "I like to total my book each month and at the end of the year, myself, for it gives me a chance to check on how we are coming out. The past year the girls' clothing came to \$24.00. Now I feel I can put aside \$2.00 each month for their clothes and it will not work a hardship any month. This is also true with other phases of expenditures."

Thirty-six Cass county homemakers who have been keeping home account books the past year will be called upon within the next two weeks by the Home Extension Agent. Their books will be checked for the purpose of seeing that nothing of importance has been omitted and those desiring to continue with the home record book will be given assistance in starting the new book for 1936. The completed books will be sent to the College of Agriculture for summarization. Last year twenty home accounts were checked and turned in for summarization.

Home account books are placed on request by the homemaker. Assistance is given in starting the book and through the year by home visits, letters, etc. Any woman interested in keeping an account should get in touch with the Farm Bureau office.

Farm Account Books Checked In.

About 100 farm account books will be completed and checked in at meetings held throughout Cass county this week. Cass county farmers seem to take more interest in farm account work than nearly any group of farmers in the state.

After the books are checked in they are taken to the Rural Economics Department at the College of Agriculture, Lincoln, and summarized. These summaries are returned to the farmers individually in the spring. The summary shows how their individual farm business compares with other farms in the county.

In spite of the severe drought the summary on books kept in 1934 showed an average net rate earned on investment at 2.23%. The highest return was 12.90% and the lowest

9.90%. The average return per \$100 invested in livestock was: Cattle \$142.00; hogs, \$229.00; poultry, \$210.00. The average power and machinery cost per acre was \$2.77. The average man labor cost per acre was \$2.53 while the average expenses per \$100 gross income was \$62.90. With better crops and higher prices this year's books should show a more favorable income than last year. Farmers that have kept these books for a period of years value the summary sheets highly as a business analysis of their farming business.

Anyone interested in keeping an account book for 1936 should get the book at the Farm Bureau office and get it started at the beginning of the new year.

Wheat Applications Submitted to State Grain Board.

Cass county wheat applications will be among the first 25 counties to be passed on by the State Grain Board on January 2nd and 3rd. The wheat applications from Cass county have been checked in the county office and were sent to the State Grain Board last Friday. From figure on the applications and the non-signers work sheet the board will set up a county wheat acreage and a county production quota. After this quota has been set up by the grain board it will be the duty of the community committees to adjust the wheat acreage for each farm under contract in their respective communities.

These committees will also decide the number of acres that are normally seeded down each year. Contract signers will be expected to have their required acres for wheat and corn in addition to what they normally seed down. It is expected that the wheat committees and the corn-hog committees will work together in setting up acreages for a farm that has both a wheat and corn-hog contract.

Interesting Speakers on Home Economics Program.

Two of the main speakers on the Home Economics Section program of Organized Agriculture, to be held at the college of agriculture, Lincoln, January 7, 8 and 9 are Miss Fannie Buchanan, who is connected with the Agricultural Extension Service at Ames, Iowa, and Mrs. Mildred Inskeep Morgan of Iowa City, Iowa. Mrs. Morgan is a graduate of the Kansas State College and has received a master's degree in Religious Education from the teachers college, Columbia University. Mrs. Morgan is a homemaker and mother and during the past four years she has given lectures and held conferences on problems of family relationships, personality adjustments, and religious education in many communities.

Some of the topics Mrs. Morgan will discuss during the three day session are "Helping Our Children to Grow Up," "Preparing Our Young People for Marriage," and "The Role of the Mother in the Family." Mrs. Fannie Buchanan is well known for the national 4-H club songs she has written. She will bring an appreciation of music into the program by her discussion of "How Man Made Music: His Instruments," "Songs Every Woman Loves," and "Feeling the Rhythm of Music."

The annual Farmers Family Fun Frolic will be held Wednesday, January 8 at 5:30 p. m. at the Student Activities building. Reservations, although not solicited, will be accepted until 12 o'clock Tuesday. Persons making reservations should call for their tickets at the Student Activities building only. No charge will be made for the evening program which starts at 7:00 p. m., second floor Student Activities building. Acts from the stage will include the state's Best Harmony, Dancing Numbers, Accordion, Floor Show, One-act play, Musical Pantomime and Comedy. After the stage show there will be dancing including popular and old time numbers. Make up a party from your community and enjoy the evening.

Detailed programs may be obtained at the Farm Bureau office.

Seedling Trees Again Available.

Applications are available at the Farm Bureau office for use in obtaining seedling trees through the extension service under provisions of the Clarke-McNary Act. Farmers wishing trees to plant this spring should file applications at once to be sure of getting them. Applications are placed on file in the order in which they are received and the orders are filled in the same manner until the supply is exhausted. Last year orders were taken in Cass county for over 18,000 trees but only 15,000 were delivered because the supply did not meet the demand.

This year a much larger stock is available and also on account of a more favorable growing season the trees will average larger and better than last spring. The broadleaf trees are one year seedlings ranging from

ten to eighteen inches in height and the evergreen transplants are three-year-old, once-transplanted stock six to ten inches in height.

The trees will be shipped about the first of April, depending on weather conditions, and will be prepaid direct to the cooperators.

The charge of \$1.00 per 100 trees include the transportation charges, either by parcel post or express.

Again we would emphasize that applications be made early if you wish trees this year.

Farm and Home Hour Will Aid 4-H Song Groups.

4-H club members interested in entering the Music Appreciation and song contests at State Fair next year should be thinking and preparing for it now. Next year's music work will be based on "Music Everyone Should Know" and will be given over the National Farm and Home Hour beginning with the first Saturday in January and continuing through until October. The music period is 11:30 to 12:30. Make a practice of listening to these programs and familiarize yourself with the music and information given.

Also we are advised that the State Club Office will have a complete set of phonograph records of selections to be used in the Music Identification contest for the 1936 State Fair. If your club is interested in securing these records get in touch with the Extension Agents.

Vegetable Hints.

Turnips are a valuable vegetable because of their Vitamin C content. The yellow turnip also furnishes vitamin A. Serve turnips raw, either in sticks like celery or diced for a salad. The crisp-textured turnip is a rare base for the crunchy and flaky salad. Combine it with carrots, cabbage, nuts, celery, apples, coconut, pineapple, green beans. With any of these the turnip will lend its useful flavor to your salad bowl. For the flakier salad, it is best to grate the turnip on a coarse grater. The juicer salads need the turnip ground. When ground and mixed with other ingredients it tastes like fresh coconut.

CROWD FRIGHTENS CROWS

Creston, Neb.—A crow hunt, with three airplanes in the air to keep the crows in the trees, proved too much of a drawing card Sunday and its promoter, Harry A. Palmateer of Creston, said the large crowd frightened most of the crows away.

He said only about 300 crows were killed. The hunt was staged in an effort to wipe out the crows who have been causing considerable damage to the corn. Palmateer said.
